## Rabbi Moshe Meir Weiss Speaks At LINK Kollel on Parenting

Rabbi Moshe Meir Weiss, the longtime Rav of Agudath Israel of Staten Island, and currently Rav of the Agudath Israel of Fairways in Lakewood, spoke at the LINK Kollel in Los Angeles on Sunday night, July 10th, on "Jewish Parenting in Turbulent Times," as part of a Shabbos of *Chizuk* in Los Angeles. A close talmid of Harav Moshe Feinstein, zt"l, a very popular speaker in the Torah world today and author of five sefarim, Rabbi Weiss did not disappoint the parents who came to hear him on his first speaking visit to Los Angeles. Rabbi Weiss stressed the importance of balance and normalcy when dealing with the problems of chinuch in today's world and he gave many practical examples.

One of his most salient points was that a parent's biggest influence on a child's life lies not so much in his words but in being the proper role model for the child to emulate. Rabbi Weiss also stressed the need to inculcate in our children the balancing act of judging ourselves by a high standard but judging those around us more favorably. He also stressed the imperative in today's very immoral world to separate ourselves from the mores and values of the gentile society around us. He strongly advised his listeners that their children will not be successful if they stand out too much from their peers. One must endeavor to find a community that will provide a healthy cohort of friends for one's chil-

Finally, he stressed the importance of imbuing our children with the love of Torah learning and *mitzvah* performance. As he put it, "Do it not because you have to, but because you want to - and to do it with joy." He felt that ball-playing is healthy for children, by imparting team work, good *middos* and healthy exercise, and by keeping them away from the internet and video games. With regard to avoiding deleterious traits, he singled out lying and onaas devarim as most disruptive to the development of good middos. To avoid the envy that many have for the material things of others, he offered a fresh perspective: we never know what's going on in a person's life. If we did, we would not be so eager to change places with them.
